Espasso

With outposts in New York and London as well as on Melrose in LA, Espasso is becoming the global go-to for modern and contemporary design from Brazil. It seems like an unexpected niche until you remember that the list includes well known midcentury modernists like José Zanine Caldas and Sergio Rodrigues, who last year opened a shop within Espasso, selling reissues of his most iconic pieces.

Galerie Half

Elegance and restraint are the bywords at this gallery, set with tableaux that demonstrate an enviably worn-in luxury, mixing rare finds—a Jean Prouvé table, a Kaare Klint sofa—with namelessbut-classic early European pieces. Gray Gallery

A favorite of Diane von Furstenberg, this spot is the work of a Parisian interior decorator and an LA-based jewelry designer. The result is a gallery that specializes in unequivocally statement-making pieces, both vintage and contemporary—a stance that's best represented by the imposing, brass-toned sculpted wall by ceramist Peter Lane. Collector and curator JF Chen is an integral part of LA's design landscape. Besides building a vast storehouse of antiques that spread across three retail locations, he has also played host to James Franco's MOCA show, "Rebel," and staged an Eames retrospective for "Pacific Standard Time." Go for modern masters like Jean Prouvé and Ettore Sottsass, but don't forget to check the latest finds from new designers.
